Know the Law

- You must be 21 years of age or older to buy, possess or use fireworks.
- -Fireworks can only be displayed between the hours of 9am to 10pm, except on Independence Day and New Years Eve, when they can be used until 12:30am the following morning.
- -The Maine law allowing the sale and use of **consumer** fireworks took effect January 1, 2012, but muncipalities still retain the right to ban the use or sale within their jurisdiction.
- -Display or Commercial Grade Fireworks are fireworks that only trained and licensed pyrotechnicians may handle and use within a regulatory structure set forth in 8 MRSA, Chapter 9-A.

Allowed Fireworks

Examples of allowed consumer fireworks are:

- Firecrackers
- Morning Glories
- Roman Candles
- Flaming Fountains

Prohibited Fireworks

"Consumer fireworks" does not include the following fireworks which are illegal to sell, possess or use in the State of Maine:

- Missile-type Rockets
- Helicopters or Aerial Spinners
- Sky Rockets & Bottle Rockets

Safety First!

FIREWORKS INJURIES CAN BE PREVENTED!

- Always read and follow label directions
- Only use outdoors on a hard, flat and level surface.
- Use fireworks in a clear, open area with spectators at least 75 feet back from launch area
- Always have a water supply handy (hose or bucket)
- Light only one firework at a time and never re-light a "dud" firework (wait 15-20 minutes and then soak it in water)
- Never light a firework in your hand or near your face and always wear protective eye wear
- <u>Never</u> launch fireworks from a metal or glass container
- <u>Never</u> modify or use homemade fireworks
- Have a designated shooter (remember, alcohol and fireworks do not mix)
- Children should never handle, play with or light fireworks and safe alternatives such as glowsticks, noise makers or fireless fireworks should be offered
- Teach children the importance of fireworks safety and set a good example for them. Extinquish used sparklers in water.

Proper Storage and Disposal

- If necessary, store fireworks in a cool, dry place away from direct heat, flame or contaminates.
- Dispose of fireworks properly by soaking them in water and then discarding them in your trashcan.

If an accident happens...

- Call **911**
- If clothing catches on fire, stop, drop and roll until it is out
- Remove clothing, shoes, diapers, and jewelry. These may hide burns and retain heat, increasing skin damage.
- Cool burn with water for a short time. Never use ice on a burn because it can make damage worse.
- Cover burn with clean, dry cloth or sheet
- Many fireworks contain chemicals that can cause burns and all chemical burns should be seen by a physician because damage may not be obvious.

PLEASE OBEY ALL LAWS AND USE FIREWORKS SAFELY!
